 - 3. **THESIS**: Underline the thesis statement. Is the thesis surprising? Does it forecast the essay's structure? How does the essay show that its thesis conflicts with alternative interpretations or views?
 - 4. **STRUCTURE**: How is the essay structured? Does it have a clear thesis, topic sentences for each body paragraph, good transitions, and so on?
 - 5. **EVIDENCE**: Where does the essay quote from the story? How are each of its points grounded in the text?
 - 6. **QUOTATIONS**: Where could the author improve the effectiveness of signal phrases, quotations, and MLA documentation in the essay?
